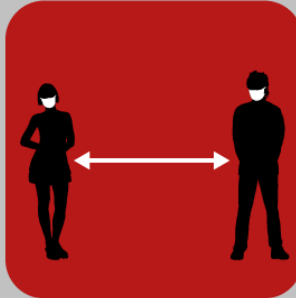

Incident Overview

IDEOC Sitreps are published weekly on Wednesdays.

- The IDEOC activated on 3/3/2020 for ID-01-2020 Coronavirus at level 2.
- The Governor issued a state declaration and the President declared a national emergency for COVID-19 on 3/13/2020.
- Four tribes and 23 counties are under current emergency orders or declarations for COVID-19. Three counties have active emergency declarations for the 3/31/20 Challis Earthquake. Four counties have emergency declarations for wildland fires.
- Idaho went to a modified Stage 2 of Idaho Rebounds on 10/26.
- The following Idaho jurisdictions have mask ordinances/mandates in place: *Panhandle Health District 1 – Benewah, Bonner, Boundary, Kootenai, Shoshone (11/19)*, Ada County (7/14), Blaine County (7/6), Bonneville County (7/21), Custer (10/1), Fremont County (9/14), Jefferson County (8/10), Lemhi (10/1), Madison County (9/14), Teton (10/1), Valley County (8/11), Bellevue (7/16), Boise (7/4), Coeur d’Alene (10/26), Driggs (7/3), Hailey (7/1), Ketchum (7/7), Moscow (7/2), *Pocatello (11/21)*, Victor (6/8), and Wallace (7/24). - *Idaho reports a total of 94,730 COVID-19 cases and 874 deaths.*

In the past week

- IDEOC continued to work requesting supplies, such as PPE, for local jurisdictions and public health districts and planning for potential surges in healthcare facilities *and vaccine distribution.*

In the next week

- The IDEOC will continue processing requests for assistance and ensuring delivery of supplies when necessary *and preparing for vaccine distribution.*

 <p>Government Services</p>	GR	Unemployment	<p><i>Idaho unemployment rates fell to 5.5% in October from 6.1% in September. Nationwide, however, unemployment claims have risen in November for two straight weeks. Experts blame the nation's unemployment rates on strain related to the COVID-19 pandemic. Should Idaho need to return to shutdown scenario, the state's unemployment rates may begin to rise and more closely reflect the nationwide average. Residents are encouraged to follow COVID-19 precautions to help avoid a shutdown.</i></p>

Some hospitals are experiencing record percentages of COVID-19 patients.</i></p>

Weather Outlook

Rain and snow is expected for the valleys, with light snow accumulations for the mountains, through Wednesday. This system will move southeastward Thursday which will keep lingering snow showers in the north and central mountains. Then, a weak feature on Saturday will bring breezy winds and isolated snow showers to the panhandle. For southern Idaho, valley inversions and air stagnation will be possible Friday through the weekend. Another weak low-pressure system could bring isolated showers to the state late Monday, but forecast confidence is low. Anticipate dry weather with the potential for valley inversions on Tuesday and Wednesday under building high pressure.

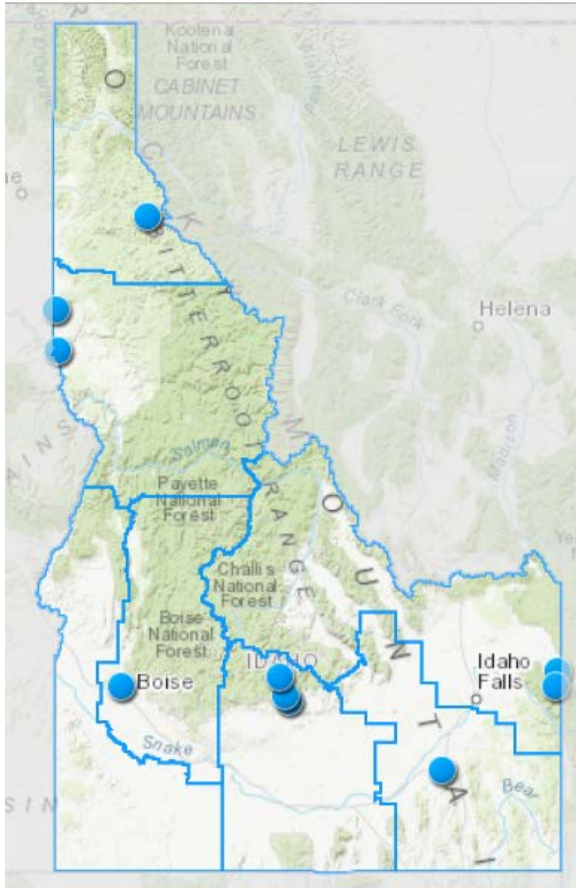
